Dear Representatives Gardner and Capps:

The undersigned national organizations in the Mental Health Liaison Group are writing to support your bill, the *Caring for America's Heroes Act*, H.R. 4656. The legislation will bring mental health treatment in line with the way physical injuries are treated under TRICARE and eliminate the limit on the number of days allowed for inpatient treatment for mental health services. Congratulations to both of you for your bipartisanship on these important mental health and substance abuse issues.

Through passage of federal parity laws, coverage for mental health and addictive disorders is on par with other medical disorders. We must now finish the parity job for our veterans and finally give TRICARE beneficiaries the full parity that other individuals now have.

We urge Congress to eliminate the limit on the number of days allowed for inpatient treatment for mental health services by passing your bill. This would improve access to inpatient mental health services. The elimination of the limit on the number of days will equalize TRICARE mental health coverage with private health insurance coverage, offer beneficiaries the choice of inpatient mental health care providers, increase access for the most seriously ill, improve continuity of care and create a more cost-effective TRICARE program.

We look forward to continuing to work with you to enact this legislation and eliminate discrimination against TRICARE beneficiaries with mental health and substance use disorders.
